With recycling the "buzz" word in today's world, I find that recycling was used centuries ago and people just didn't know they were "recycling". They were just using common sense ideas that were handed down from generation to generation. So this month I will pass down things to do with egg shells that has been used for centuries and many of us just didn't know it.



Egg shell are very high in calcium making them very desirable and valuable for the garden. Any calcium loving plant will appreciate your composting efforts. Many people wash the egg shells before adding them to their compost and many do not. Egg shells can be crushed fine and added to the base of a plants. Plants that love the calcium are such plants as Tomatoes and Roses. It is claimed that crushed shell is also a preventative for such diseases as Blossom End Rot, common in tomato plants.

Egg shells has been a long time slug and insect deterrent. Sprinkle crushed egg shells around your garden. The egg shells cuts the internal organs of Slugs and many other insects.

Many people take care in the way they break open the eggs and save the shells for starter cups for their spring plants. You can poke small drain holes to the bottom of the egg shells, add the potting soil and seeds and have an inexpensive 12 pack of plants for the garden. Each individual egg will be planted into the ground. You do not remove the plant from the shell, you just crush the shell thus allowing the roots to escape at planting time and there is very little expense for spring plants.

Things our grandmothers and grandfathers did "back then" now amaze us. We think it is such a novel idea not knowing it has been around for literally hundreds of years. Our grandparents lived on farms raising their own chickens for meat and eggs. They were very resourceful when money was tight and used what was available to them. They used egg shells for many different things but always made sure that they had enough to crush, bake, and feed back to their chickens to ensure the quality of future egg shells. So with that in mind... when you are enjoying eggs for breakfast and looking out the window at your roses, remember you never know where you will find a "TREASURE", this time it is the Egg..

Egg Salad

- 10 eggs
- 1/4 c. mayonnaise
- 2 TBS Sweet pickle relish
- 1/4 c. chopped celery
- 2 TBS chopped sweet onion
- 2 TBS Dijon style mustard

Peel and chop eggs into small pieces. Drain and add Pickle relish. Add all other ingredients. Stir until well mixed. Serve on Bread, toast, Lettuce leafs or with crackers. Enjoy!
